A CUP OF JOE

"The redeeming love of God can do what we can't"

Today's readings call us to have a greater commitment and understanding of the love that God has for us. Christ commands us to love our neighbor as he loves us and the readings also proclaim that we are no longer slaves, but friends who are to go out and bear the fruit of Christ's sacrificial love to others.

Several years ago, I was given the privilege and opportunity to lead spiritual gatherings for our brothers who were locked up and facing hard times at a Milwaukee detention center. It was my first-time doing prison ministry, so I thought and wondered what type of inspiration I could bring to the gentlemen that were now placed in a hopeless situation. Happily, it was the other way around. The gentlemen brought light into my life. I recall most of the gentlemen explaining how they had experienced a lack of love somewhere in their lives and that lack of love seemed to have led these gentlemen to become slaves to their passion. After understanding that, my heart has a deeper understanding of Christ's love for me. Many people in the world make bad decisions because of the lack of love they have experienced their whole lives.

I now realize why Love is God's greatest commandment. God's love is enduring and redeeming and it can go where our love is limited. Where this is an absence of love, there is the presence of fear. Fear can be the precursor to other emotions like despair, brokenness, lack of self-control, and sorrowfulness. On the contrary, In Thomas Aquinas's *Summa Theologica*, he states that fear can lead to love.

"He states that fear can give rise to love; insofar as, for instance, through fear of God's punishments, man keeps His commandments, and thus begins to hope, while hope leads to love"

When Jesus states that there is one commandment and it is love, we can recognize that if we keep and honor that commandment, we overcome fear and give birth to hope and other virtues. Thomas a Kempis' *Imitation of Christ* states, "We should recognize that Love can be the greatest virtue, it's our walk with love that resembles Christ the most. Love is all the virtues like patience, courage, prudence and strength merging into one."

The Franciscan nun, Mother Angelica, in her book, *In the Shadow of his light*, gives a short list of ways we can love our neighbor as Jesus loves us,

- -Putting our neighbor at ease by answering a situation
- -Weeping with those who weep and laughing with those who laugh
- -Protecting our neighbor's good name by not manifesting their faults to others
- -Loving the sinner, though hating the sin
- -Helping those in need without making them feel we are being condescending

Lastly she states, knowing everything in life is passing and loving Jesus is a very important part of our lives.

Evangelization Committee Bible Question of the Week

Today's Gospel follows immediately after the Gospel proclaimed last week in which Jesus taught that he was the vine and that His disciples were the branches. In the example of the vine and the branches, we learned that our union with Jesus leads to fruitful service. Today's reading extends this teaching to describe the kind of service that Christians are called upon to offer to others. This reading, like last week's, is part of Jesus' Last Supper discourse. Jesus tells his disciples, "This is my commandment: love one another as I love you. No one has greater love than this, to lay down one's life for one's friends." Jesus gives us the greatest example of this kind of love and service. He laid down his life for his friends, his disciples, and for us. Jesus goes on to say, "It was not you who chose me, but I who chose you and appointed you to go and bear fruit that will remain, so that whatever you ask the Father in my name he may give you. This I command you: love one another." The disciples were chosen and commanded to bear fruit, We have been chosen and appointed with the same purpose - to love and bear fruit through sacrificial service. Does today's Gospel help you to better understand Jesus as the true vine and his Father as the vine grower, and how we are able to obey the command to live with intentional love and service? If so, how?


